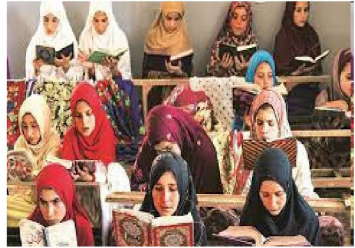

'Will I be illiterate?': In Taliban's Afghanistan, girls fight back — attend secret classes, refuse to disappear

Sometimes women can be spotted walking in a park in the morning, in groups of three or four, covered head to toe in black. Some parks have designated days for men and women, and some, like the famous Bagh-e-Babur, have separate gendered sections.

While a large number of women have been rendered invisible already, the silver lining is that they have refused to disappear fully from public spaces. They cover themselves in the prescribed dress code, and try and continue their lives as best as they can.

A woman waits for a friend by the roadside, looking anxiously into her phone. In less affluent areas, women are out shopping for vegetables and fruits at roadside markets. And the number of women begging on the streets, children in tow, has gone up so much that the Taliban have announced they are going to round them up.

On a Friday, the weekly holiday, a group of women, all from one family, along with their children — all of them girls — sit around a long table in a restaurant. The introductions that go around the table offer a brief glimpse into how the lives of middle-class, educated Afghan women have been affected by a year of Taliban rule.

"We have come out like this after a long time... nearly six months. It has been a depressing time for everyone, especially the girls. They can't go to school anymore," says Nadia Shokri, a doctor working with an international NGO that has projects in Nuristan, Nangarhar, Pakia, Ghazni and Fara provinces of Afghanistan.

"I have to travel to supervise field work. I am really happy with the work I do, but now the problem is, we cannot go to far-off places without a mahram. I take my husband. But he does not like to come with me all the time because he has his own job. That is why now I go only once every two or three months," she says.

The mahram rule has seen many international organisations and their local partners, which have tried to retain most of their women employees, hiring married couples.

Famatullah Kohistani has been working in the government department of museums since 2003, and is posted at the National Museum of Afghanistan. "I still work there, but only in name. They have asked us not to go to work. We are not allowed to attend private English coaching classes known as 'course'. This is the only kind

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college education in Afghanistan, particularly that of girls, was in critical condition even before the Taliban took over last year. Between 2002 and 2020, the country made small strides in education, but the effort was stymied by the war between foreign forces and the Taliban.

In a report earlier this month, UNICEF said even before the Taliban takeover last year, 4.2 million Afghan children were out of school, of whom 60 per cent were girls. Only 4.2 per cent of girls are in tertiary education compared to over 14 per cent for boys. In a report in June, the UN Assistance Mission in Afghanistan warned that unless the Taliban allowed girls access to secondary education, the next two or three months, an entire generation of girls was at risk of not being able to complete their full 12 years of basic education.

Asked if as a Pashtun, he supported the Taliban, he said he is mainly Pashtun. "I am a driver with nine children — five girls and four boys — said, "What have they done for me that I should support them? Let them first allow girls to go back to school, then I will be the first to come out on their side."

A woman activist is scathing about the "Great Game" that the US played on the people of her country. "America does not want peace in Afghanistan, that is why they funded the war. It is the world that has gone through 43 years of unremitting and incessant violence and conflict and occupation. There are cultural and budgetary constraints, then there is a lack of resources, infrastructure, teachers, books. But the government is working extremely hard to try to address this problem," says Balkhi. "Our policy is education for all Afghan citizens, irrespective of gender."

If the international community "genuinely" wants to help Afghanistan, says Balkhi, it should "not weaponise this issue, and can very easily assist Afghanistan in those areas that are open for them to assist". Then, as the government continues to work to address the remaining problems (in education), "help it, instead of trying to find moral justifications for some of the very inhumane actions that they are taking, such as the sanctions on Afghanistan, freezing of assets, and the blacklist. So there's work to be done by both sides."

Dismissing the suggestion that the Taliban were insecure about empowered, educated women who might challenge their interpretation of Islam, Balkhi says, "The women of Afghanistan are Muslim, they don't challenge our beliefs. Human societies are such that people have different views on different laws.

But at the end of the day, it's the government that enacts those laws. Devastated by decades of war, school and

security personnel ended the siege about 30 hours later, as claimed by al-Shabab.

According to a 2020 report, it collects more revenue than the government, has built one of the strongest terrorist machines in the continent, and is now seeking to expand its influence across the Horn of Africa.

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UK, Gulf countries and Egypt among 7 new locations on IIT expansion list

A committee set up by the Centre for the Global Expansion of IITs has, in consultation with Indian missions abroad, identified UK, UAE, Egypt, Saudi Arabia, Qatar, Malaysia and Thailand as prospective locations for offshore campuses under the "Indian International Institute of Technology" brand name. The Sunday Express has learnt. These seven countries ranked high on several key parameters, according to a report submitted to the Ministry of Education by the 17-member committee, led by IIT Council standing committee chairperson Dr K Radhakrishnan. The parameters include level of interest and commitment, academic lineage, conducive ecosystem to attract faculty and students, regulatory provisions and potential benefits to enhance IIT branding and relation. The report is based on feedback from heads of 26 Indian missions, with the IIT Council section of the Ministry of External Affairs for a meeting between the committee and embassy officials on February 2 and March 28. According to inputs shared by the Indian High Commission in the UK, the mission has obtained "six concrete proposals for cooperation from University of Birmingham, King's College London, University of Exeter, University of Oxford, University of Cambridge and University College London". Our mission has made multiple requests for a meeting between the universities and the IIT committee. It has further requested for a detailed concept note and nodal contact point for taking forward this proposal," stated the report, which was reviewed by The Sunday Express. The report also states that IIT-Delhi is the preferred choice for UAE, Saudi Arabia, Egypt and Malaysia. According to the report, Egypt is keen to launch an arrangement, online or physical, from 2022-23.

Fight for survival: On Somalia's fight against terror

The delicate but peaceful transition of power in Somalia earlier this year after the delayed but successful completion of the legislative and presidential elections has raised hopes that the conflict-ridden country in the Horn of Africa was finally moving towards some political stability. But Friday's siege of an upscale hotel in the capital Mogadishu — at least 20 people were killed — is a grave reminder of the security challenges the country is facing despite the promises made by the new administration of President Hassan Sheikh Mohamud to ideologically, financially, and militarily defeat violent extremist militants who stormed the hotel and took several civilians hostage before
